FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: Q & A



Nathan Wilkerson Adjunct Instructor, Graduate Business Tools of Choice: Blackboard Wiki and Prezi

Q: What did you find beneficial about using Prezi and the Blackboard wiki tool?

A: The wiki tool in Blackboard and the third party site, Prezi, allowed my students to engage their creativity and express themselves in ways that transcended the limits imposed by written responses alone. The wiki tool allowed students to process the information presented in the course holistically and visually. At the conclusion of a unit on the church, students were to create their own imaginary church website within a wiki that I had set up. The assignment required that they not only apply their understanding of the church and share it with their classmates but that they consider other factors such as how the location on the page, particular fonts, images and external links all contributed to the overall message they were trying to convey. The wiki also enhanced collaborative learning by providing greater appeal and, thereby, greater engagement over the work of others in the course. Prezi is a webbased presentation tool which uses flash animation and can be shared online. Not only are prezis fun to create, but the process of putting one together facilitates the synthesis of information as students are allowed to brainstorm on the canvas and then order their ideas around a visual theme.

Q: How did you manage grading?

A: The wiki tool makes grading easy, since it allows the instructor to assign one grade to each student's total contribution. In my case, one student grade was given for both the original wiki page and for any comments made to the wiki pages of others. Prezi, on the other hand, presented several challenges to grading. The first challenge I encountered was in regards to specifying a minimum size to the project. Since the technology was new, students were initially unsure as to what constituted a substantial prezi. I found that mandating a minimum number of "path steps" resolved this issue well. In order to post a prezi grade within Blackboard, I created either a discussion board forum or a journal where students could submit links to their prezis. I then entered the grades within those areas.

Q: What advice do you have for other instructors who want to start using these tools?

A: I believe tools such as wikis and Prezi are important resources to online instructors since we are teaching, for the most part, tech-proficient learners who access information and express it in ways that transcend traditional media. That being the said, many will be still be new to these specific tools, so instructors using them must take extra care to communicate expectations for excellent work in each media and provide examples. An instructor might want to allow multiple attempts for the first few assignments which utilize these technologies until students become comfortable with them. It will require a bit of extra work in the design, but the result will be better engagement with the material and with other students in the course.
